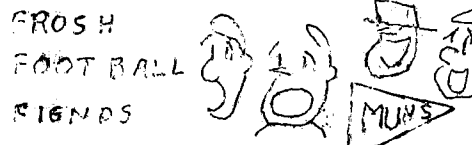
In the season opener against Campion's young and untried team, a stout defense and Tom Cross-dalle's 1 yard sneak gave Marquette the victory.

In the Jordan game, the passing combination of Gary McCoy to Rex Lour spelled defeat for Marquette. We rallied in the last quarter only to fumble on Jordan's 12 yard line with less than a minute to go.

Against St. Catherine's the Toppers rallied from a 25-13 deficit at the beginning of the fourth quarter to eke out a 26-25 thriller. The rally was led by the running of senior halfback Gary Gradisnik, who scored the winning touchdown.

Against Dominican's White Knights, our Toppers jumped to a seemingly safe 25--12 lead. With 2 minutes remaining, Dominican rallied with a long bomb and short run, cutting our lead to six points at the final gun.

This Sunday the Toppers take on an injury-riddled Cathedral team at North Stadium. Cathedral was last year's homecoming victim, 45-12, and will fall to us again with your support. Game time is 2 o'clock, so be there!



Mr. Lawrence Siewert, frosh football coach,

is optimistic as to the team's chances for the remainder of the season. He hopes to develop them into a quick and speedy unit to compensate for their small size, which has not been the case in the past few years. Although last season's record of six and two is not impossible to equal, improving on it will be difficult because of the lack of truly outstanding material.

In the first outing against St. Joe's, Marquette's Frosh used a balanced attack to defeat the Lancers 6-0. On the third play from scrimmage, Tom Cavanaugh raced fifty-five yards for a touchdown. Fumbles, penalties, and mix-ups hurt the Topper's chances for further scoring. St. Joe's only bid for a T.D. was thwarted by a clipping penalty.

In their last game against Bosco, a pass from Dennis Larkin to Pat Dunphy on the last play of the half resulted in a Marquette score. Pat Cannon then went over for the extra point.

Defensive stand-outs have been Joe Carroll, Tom Witosky, Dick Goyette, Bruce Johanson, Pat Dunphy, and Rick Bridich. As for an undefeated season, Coach Siewert has this to say: "They have a chance to go undefeated if they work together as a team". If Coach Siewert can instill into his players the enthusiasm he has shown for the season, he will have another championship frosh football team.

Marquette's sophomores had to wait no longer than one year to gain full revenge for last year's one point defeat suffered at the hands of their Bosco counterparts.

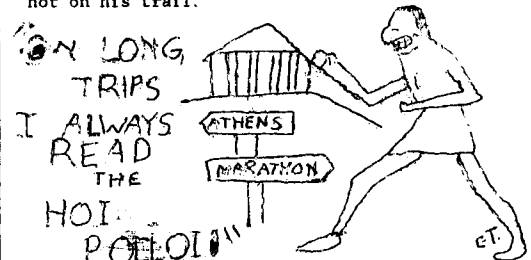
