## Senior Follies

OOT, S.J., a musical satire of a James Bond hero at M.U.H.S. was presented by the Class of '66 last weekend. The show, directed by Messers. Dolan and Suehr, S.J., was well written (not ordinary lines, these) and executed with precision.

At show's beginning we are confronted with a troubled Mr. Kopen-ski. Sneakin' Sammy, Mr. K's shadow, overhears a conversation between Fr. On Thursday evening, students pose as employees at Frenchi's and learn of the plan to inspect the stadium and close the deal with the A.F.L. on Saturday morning; this they promptly plan to sabotoge.

In the end, however --as you might expect--good triumphs over evil, the students foil the faculty. The students rig and wreck the stadium, ruining the A.F.L. deal: foot-ball is saved and ballet postponed for another day.

The Follies were liberally salted with satire, poking good-hearted fun at Fr. Traynor, THE TRUTH, THE FLAMBEAU MONTHLY, Mr. Andrychowicz, various others in the faculty, JUG, Ink, and so on.

The smooth-running, polished performances which were presented on three consecutive nights were the result of hard work and co-operation of a spirited cast and a devoted crew of technicians behind the scenes.

## VARSITY ELIMINATED

### GRIPPING GRAPPLERS FROM CONTENTION...

This year Coach Ryan boasts 110 men trying out for a berth on Marquette's wrestling team. The popularity of this great endurance sport is due to the fact that a wrestler competes against an opponent of his own weight. The 12 weights range from 95lbs. to heavyweight, over 180 lbs.

Expected to contribute greatly to the team's record this year are Dave End, Mike Carlton, Warren Wetzel, and John Schmitt. This year's co-captains are Wetzel and Schmitt.

With a field of 110 men to choose from, Mr. Ryan has good reason to consider his chances excellent for the state wrestling championship.

### FROSH FOOTBALL

Marquette's best offensive showing of the season combined with a strong defense and routed Messmer 33-0. A twelve yard run by Rick Bridich set off the fireworks, composed of five touchdowns and three extra points. Messmer ran into a stiff Marquette defense which allowed them to penetrate inside the ten yard line only twice.

Marquette's chances for an undefeated season and the conference title were spoiled, however, when an inspired Jordan team took advantage of what was not the Toppers' best Saturday morning showing. Jordan was led by Jim Gilbert (who scored a touchdown on a 70-yard interception run) and Berni Sarret (who made a 10-yard jaunt through the Marquette defense. The only successful march by the Toppers resulted in a lone score. Besides knocking us out of the top spot in the league, Jordan's 12 points marked the first time Marquette's defense had allowed a score by the opposition. A victory over Pius and a loss by Jordan would give Marquette a tie for the title.

### BUCKET-BALL '66

The 1966 basketball season should prove very exciting and challenging for Marquette's team. All the starters for last year's state champions have been graduated, leaving the present team somewhat inexperienced.

The team began regular practice on Nov. 1. and has been working out since then. All the players are able to run the mile in under 6 minutes, a mark of endurance and speed.

The defending state champs will open the season Friday, Nov. 19, at West Division, and conclude it five months later in the state tournament. Coach John Glaser's crew will play twenty games (not including the tournament play), 8 at home, 12 away. Teams to beat, according to Mr. Glaser, are: St. Kates, Jordan, Pius, and Messmer. But the coach is confident that with the backing of the student body, we can retain our position on top. Among those counted on to return Marquette to the top ranking are seniors Johnson, Michuda, Kurzawa; juniors Sonnenberg, Wakefield, Dickey, and Cavallo; sophomore Maloney. Bill Michuda is this year's captain.

In their last three games the Hilltoppers pulled out two victories to stay in the championship race, but then fell out of the picture Sunday with a loss to Pius.

North Stadium was the scene of Marquette's most decisive victory of the season, 34-12. Their victim was St. John's, which was helpless against the long touchdown passes of Tom Crossdale. The whole Marquette offensive attack was great, but not so with the Eagles. Palmiscano was the lone bright spot for Cathedral. Running and pass-receiving, he dominated the Eagle offense. Rick Miller, the Eagle quarterback, also connected on two touchdown strikes to prevent a shutout.

In Marquette's homecoming game the Toppers came up with a 6-0 victory over Waukesha Memorial's Crusaders. On the winning side, Ted Casper scored all the points with a short plunge after the Hilltopper had gone on the ground to the one yard line. In fact, Marquette drove on the ground all day, attempting only two passes (both incomplete) while amassing 240 yards on the ground. Memorial could do little with the ball (as the score indicated) and Dickey thwarted the only real threat when he knocked down a would-be touchdown pass at the end of the first half.

Things looked bad from the very beginning at M.U. Stadium Sunday against Pius. The Pops finally downed any championship hopes, 18-6.

Chris Charnish connected on two touchdown passes, with Ron Jurewicz taking a nine yarder and Mike Ryan snagging one from 29 yards out. Jurewicz balanced the Pius attack with 149 yards in 25 attempts carrying.

The Hilltoppers also moved the ball well but four fumbles in crucial plays proved fatal. The Toppers averted a whitewash in the closing seconds when Crossdale heaved a pass to Mike Dries for a 45-yard TD.

Although now out of the running for top honors, M.U.H.S. still has something to say about who will be champ. If we whip the Dons this Sunday, there would be a tie for first place between Don Bosco and the winner of the Jordan-Pius tilt.

### SOPH FOOTBALL

Playing solid ball, the sophomore squad notched two more victories at the expense of Messmer and Cathedral. Shutout scores of 20-0 and 44-0 gave hints of a strong varsity next year.

Quarterback Tom Ryan completed 5 of 8 passes for 143 yards, and Johannes displayed his usual brand of play, scampering 35 yards for a score. Touchdown passes to Shurf for 34 yards and to McCormick for 70 completed the scoring. Cherney and Graeven added the points for the 20-0 final. Messmer was held to -12 yards.

The J.V.'s momentum defeated Cathedral 44-0. Cherney and Hall scored two touchdowns apiece; Race and McCormick one each. The real breadwinner was a 97 yard punt-return by Schurf. Schmanski's fine effort helped keep the defense keyed up. The sophs boast a 5-1 record and play Pius tomorrow for the championship.
