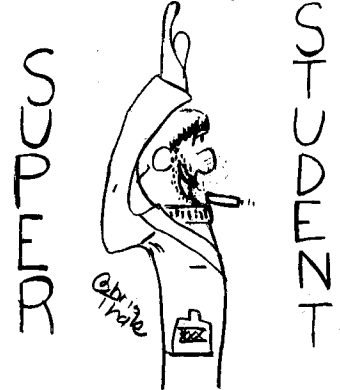
REVIEWS AND PREVIEWS

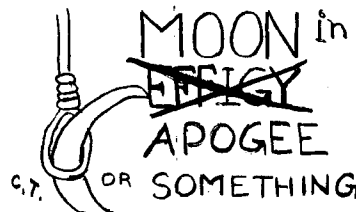

TOPPERS TAKE 2

Sophs-CHAMPS! TOPPLE TECH

After losing their first two games, nobody gave the Sophs a chance to take the crown. But this was not to be the case. Two and a half weeks ago against Plus they wrapped up the crown.

Marquette started the game with a running attack, but then faked out Plus when Ryan (Tom) connected a 52 yard touchdown pass to Jim McCormack. McCormack then left a stunned Plus defense picking dust out of their eyes. Plus, anxious to score, rallied with a fine effort, but time ran out before they had a chance to score.

In the second half Plus kicked off to Schirf who returned the ball 34 yards for another Topper score. Plus got the ball and scored two quick touchdowns to go ahead 14-13. A determined Marquette squad came back by driving into Plus territory and then topping off the game with a 48 yard touchdown pass, Ryan to McCormack. This wrapped up the game; score, 18-14.

The Plus game ended the season marked by a balanced offense and defense. It closed a season of fine playing by Johannes, Ryan, McCormack, Schirf, Schwanzki, and, of course, FRED. These are just a few. There were many others.

The Sophs won a hard fought championship by winning this game. They celebrated by tossing Coach Laebl, fully donned, into the shower. Mr. Ryan, S.J., took refuge in the closet before they got to him.

DONS DOWNED

Terrific is the only word that can be used to describe Marquette's upset victory over Don Bosco. This game was the last of the season, and, true to form, it was by far the best. A quick charging line pushed the Dons all over the field. The first score, Marquette's,

was on a 55 yard pass from Crossville to Salchert early in the game. Although the Dons gathered force and came right back to score the next time they got their hands on the ball, this was the only time they really got moving.

Marquette moved well on offense all through the game, but three interceptions marred the Toppers' chances for further scoring. It looked as though the game would end in a tied score until late in the fourth quarter when Marquette executed a sudden drive, capped by a 3 yard run by John Townsend. Binder kicked the extra point. The game was iced when Bosco's Jordens failed to pick up a crucial first down.

Marquette's great defense was inspired by Bob Teske, Kevin Dunn, Horace Dickey, and Terry Johnson.

Marquette, defending state champions, got off to a good start, defeating West Division and Boys' Tech on two consecutive nights of non-conference play. The team needs the experience of working together, but this is more than to be expected after losing all five of the starters from last year's champs. Nowinski and Tom Cavallo come to the team without any varsity experience last year. It might be a re-building year, but it should also be a winning year. The starting "six" all showed promise: Nowinski, Cavallo, Dickey, Wakefield, Sonnenberg, and captain Michuda.

The final score of the West game looked convincing, 62-53, but easily-made-missed shots under the boards told the story that it was still early in the season. The team looked stronger against Tech (63-47), and team unity was markedly stronger than in the West opener. In one important respect this year's team seems much stronger than last year's--free throws. One missed out of 22 is 1-riffic!

SOPHS

Coach Cuppa's soph team should have some fine material this year, losing only two men to the varsity. The 14 point loss in the West opener might be credited to the fact that it was the opener. Evidence of the team's strength came the following evening when they outscored Tech by ten big ones.

The B-team Toppers have good sights for the rim. Jack Fleming and 6'2" Mel Wattenbach should keep the score-keepers busy all season long. Tim Lechmaier, Ken Sadowski, Tim Sheehan, and Steve Schirf fill out a developing team.

Swift Swimmers Swim Swell

Mr. Innes Switzer, varsity swimming coach, is optimistic about the team's chances for an undefeated season. This year's team may be one of the most powerful in Marquette's history. Graduation claimed only three swimmers from last year's team, a team which splashed its way to an undefeated season and rewrote the record books. Evidence of this strength is a letterman returning to swim in every event.

Captains for this season are Jim Bonifas and Ed Kult, both holders of school records. Jim Luettgen, who may be the best swimmer this state has ever seen, will be the backbone of the team. He will have plenty of support. In freestyle there are seniors Ryan and Buskiewicz to help out Luettgen, Bonifas and Kult. In the other strokes there are David Reichl, who holds the school record for the breast stroke, and juniors Quinn and Malloy to swim the backstroke. Rounding out the varsity will be several sophomores who smashed many a freshman record last year. Mike Stch will do the diving.

RASSLIN'

After almost two weeks of practice, two tournaments and three cuts, Marquette's wrestling team has been reduced to about fifty men. For the regular season Coach Ryan, S.J., will carry 12 varsity and 12 "B" team agonists (all of whom Mr. Ryan terms his "inner core"). Another twenty grapplers will continue to develop themselves to be replacements for injured regulars.

The two tournaments thus far have been on Saturday and Wednesday of a week ago and this past Saturday. These wrestle-offs help to determine who is fit varsity material.

The first meet of the regular season will be held on Tuesday, December 7. Mr. Ryan believes that this team has potentials for a state championship and they can greatly use your support.
