## Loss to Loyola

The First Annual M.U.H.S. Wrestling Invitational Tournament held Thursday, Dec. 30, ended in somewhat of a catastrophe for Marquette's wrestlers, now boasting a 6-0 conference record.

Of the 8 teams participating (Mt. Carmel, Loyola, Jordan, Don Bosco, Memorial, Cathedral, Wis. Lutheran, and Marquette), the Toppers pulled out with an unimpressive sixth place. Loyola of Chicago took the first place trophy with 63 points, while Chicago's other representative, Mt. Carmel, took second with 49 points.

Marquette's 33 points included a second place by Tim Cotter (180 lbs.) third places by Dan Bachhuber, Joe Wimmer, and Warren Wetzel, and three fourth places.

The poor finish in the tournament was quite ironic, since our mat men have beaten Wisconsin Lutheran, Memorial, and Don Bosco, teams which finished ahead of Marquette in the final point standings.

Next to take on the Toppers was a tough Pius team. Unable to pump in the two pointers, the Toppers fell far behind. Mike Barris, Pat Cannon, and Ed Sadowski got the team going in the second half, but they couldn't catch the sharp-shooting Pius Popes. The final score was 45-25.

Since our last issue much has happened in varsity basketball. But due to the inexperience of the team and lack of student support, the team has not fared too well. Since our last publication the team lost to St. Kate's and Cathedral.

It then bounced back against St. Joseph's, 83-70, but fell to Notre Dame, 63-54. Over the Christmas holiday the team took a trip to Menasha, and lost to St. Mary's in a non-conference game.

More recently the student body took a trip to Pius, mainly to show that Marquette has a spirit which no school can match. MUHS was in the cellar of the league, and couldn't really expect to win, but didn't count on a 17 point loss either.

The game started and things got bad quickly. Pius' Rehm pulled down the jump and got a point for Pius on a foul shot. But things started looking up, MUHS grabbed a 6-1 lead, and was doing well under the boards. But then it began: whistle, turnover, whistle, foul shot, whistle, another turnover. All night the Marquette crowd had to contend with that constant whistling in their ears. Marquette may have lost the game, but certainly not by 17 points.

FOUL.

On Sunday Marquette won, not too surprisingly, a game against St. Bonaventure, 76-35. This, coupled with a Jordan loss puts Jordan one game behind Marquette in the standings. There is hope yet.

Meanwhile Pius won and Messmer beat St. Kate's to put Pius in first place all alone. Messmer and St. Catherine are both one game behind with 5<sup>th</sup> records.

## FROSH B.B.

The Freshman basketball team got off

to a good start, tilting Brookfield, Central 49-45 in their first game this year. Trailing at halftime by 7 points, they were sparked by Dennis Larkin and Al McGuire, Jr. who took charge scoring 17 points each.

The conference opener against St. Catherine saw a low scoring game with the Toppers on the short end of a 32-24 final. Nothing went right in this game as Bob Burg's 6 points was the most a single player could amass alone.

But with McGuire returning to form, and the Toppers controlling the backboards, Marquette rolled to a 48-33 victory over Cathedral. McGuire led the team with 14 points.

When the Hilltoppers invaded Notre Dame they were looking for a tough contest. At the end of regular time the score was deadlocked at 40 all. Then in overtime Hohn Bachay of Notre Dame sank two free Throws with seconds remaining to defeat Marquette 44-42. Al McGuire scored 14 and Tom Wozny had 11.
