### Sodality Retreat

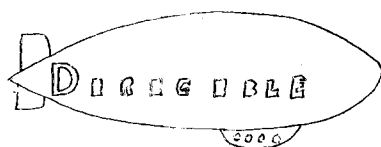

## Varsity Bounces Back

### Fighting Freshmen

After getting off to a rather slow start early in the season, the Frosh basketball team has really come to life. Last night, in beating Notre Dame, 42-26, Al McGuire posted a new freshman scoring record by putting 17 points on the board, bring his total to 254 for the year.

The team has now won ten straight, and if they beat Pius on Sunday, they are assured of at least a tie with Pius for first place.

Earlier this season, Marquette lost to St. Catherine's by nine points, but the inspired frosh team played a great game in their second meeting and knocked off St. Kate's by two points.

The next victim to fall foe to Marquette was Cathedral. With McGuire contributing 29 points, the Toppers beat Cathedral 50-19. Then the team travelled down to Kenosha and knocked off St. Joe's 40-24.



### Takes Notre Dame, St. Joe's

Posting a spirited victory over Notre Dame last evening, Marquette looks forward to the game with Pius on Sunday. The victory over Notre Dame came after a sea-saw battle in the first half, with Marquette trailing for a good deal of the time. But by half-time Marquette was ahead 30-29. The third quarter was all Marquette, as was shown by a ten point lead at that quarter's end. The lead lengthened in the fourth quarter, and the victory was ours. The final score: 72-50.

#### The Season So Far:

The Marquette-St. Joseph skirmish carried Coach John Glaser's squad into the better half of the Catholic Conference race with a 7-7 record.

The Hilltoppers, trailing at the half, quickly rallied and never fell behind again. The final score, 54-50, was highlighted by Tom Sonnenberg's 19 points.

Although Marquette is sporting a so-so record this year, they are having a say as to who will get the championship; they play Pius Sunday, and they have already beaten St. Catherine.

Starting February 22, Marquette will be a home of the regionals for the Catholic High School Basketball tournament, featuring Messmer vs. Pius. Meanwhile, Marquette will be at Pius, fighting for the spoils with either Don Bosco, Cathedral, De Sales, or Notre Dame.

### RASSLE ROUGHLY

Since November the Marquette High Wrestling Team has been working diligently for the high point of their season: the State Tournament at Kenosha.

This year our team has compiled a record of 10 wins and 3 losses, and we feel positive that we've got the team for

the job at the tournament. The line-up: at 95, Clarence Kaestner, a good prospect for a state title; at 106, Mike Carlton, a defending state champion; at 115, Joe Bradish; at 120, Dave Foti; at 127, Tom Blackwood; at 136, D. Bergaur; at 143, Warren Wetzel; at 148, Joe Wimmer; at 157, John Schmitt; at 168, Chuck Risch; at 180, Tim Cotter who has compiled the best individual record of the season thus far; at heavyweight, Greg Schwabe.

We feel that this is the team that will take the state and bring back the championship to Marquette.

## SOPH BALL TOPS

The sophs clobbered Notre Dame last evening 42-31. Jack Fleming led the scoring with 9 points. Wattenbach and Olson were second with 6 each. Thus they continue to have the best season of any of the three cage teams, Varsity, Soph and Frosh.

After a disappointing loss to West Division, 41-31, they came together to dump Boy's Tech, 39-29, Custer, 52-24, and Cathedral, 47-26. They lost to St. Joe's in the last ten seconds, 39-38.

They seemed to recover well as they then took on Notre Dame and Don Bosco. Led by Mel Wattenbach, they dumped the South Siders, 48-33. After a two week lay off, they succeeded in stamping out Pius, 36-26. Tim Harrigan drew a starting assignment as he and the other second-year men were in fine form. On January 9 they crushed a weak St. Bonaventure team, 45-14. The Bonnies, however, were all freshmen except for two players. Ken Sadowski was hot in the second half with 12 points. Con Geary paced the first half scoring 7. The next weekend resulted in two victories for the J.V.'s over Jordan and Memorial. Mel Wattenbach was hot on both occasions as he poured in 12 against Jordan and 19 against Memorial. He looked especially good against the Waukesha team as he held the team together until they could get going in the fourth quarter.

Then came Dominican and a loss, but the Toppers easily pushed aside Don Bosco, 44-25.

Next they travelled to Messmer. The J.V.'s were virtually shelved by the Messmer men in the first half, behind by 12 at the halfway mark. But the Toppers, indefatigable stalwarts that they are (no ordinary basketballers, these), stormed on and turned the verdict back on the Bishops in the final 12 minutes. led by Dennis Olson who who put Coach Czuppa's cagers in the lead with ten seconds left. At the gun Wattenbach was fouled and made both free throws to finish the game. They then went on to win another close
